# Turtle in Paradise by Jennifer L. Holm 2011 Newbery Honor Book

Set during the Great Depression, this historical fiction book follows a girl named Turtle who is forced to move from New Jersey to Key West, Florida to live with relatives she's never met. She discovers secrets, scams, and even buried pirate treasure! Before she knows what's happened, Turtle finds herself coming out of the shell she's spent her life building, and as she does, her world opens up in the most unexpected ways.

After completing the required book, complete the attached worksheet and return to your 4th grade teacher on the first day of school, along with your reading log.
