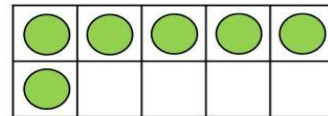

Whenever you have two or more consonants stuck between two vowels you want to divide them up so that each vowel has its own consonant.

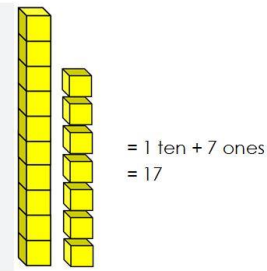
